May 30<sup>th</sup>

passed through Slafford Bletchley and London arrived Shorecliffe at 4 pm England looks most beautiful went into Rishworth Barracks at 6 pm excellent quarters saw an aeroplane and a dirigible overhead. it is an ideal place for a camp the weather is fine + warm we are close to Folkestone and the sea.

May 31<sup>st</sup>

Our Battalion is quarantined on account of measles in the camp.

~~June 1<sup>st</sup>~~  
received news of great naval battle off the coast of gutland band turned out and played national airs

June 6<sup>th</sup>

received the sad news that the H.M.S. Hampshire had been sunk with Lord Kitchener and his staff on board.

June 11<sup>th</sup>

Church service at 9:30 am in memory of the late Lord Kitchener Englands greatest soldier who lost his life when the H.M.S. Hampshire went down.

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after striking a mine  
off the Orkney Islands on  
June the 5<sup>th</sup> 1916 only 12  
survivors who were saved  
by clinging to a raft.  
the band played the dead  
march and the bugles  
sounded last post.  
drums were draped in  
black very impressive service

June 18

quarantine is lifted  
except from units where  
there are measles.

went down to Folkestone  
first time very nice place  
beautiful promenade called  
the Leas. beach not very  
good, too many pebbles.

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June 19<sup>th</sup>

Medical inspection in the  
morning I am taken to  
Moone Barnacks Hospital  
Ward 23 with measles  
do not think it is measles  
am not very sick

quite a number of men  
with the same thing  
from other battalions,  
one with concussion of  
the brain and shell shock  
just back from the front

July 1<sup>st</sup>

Dominion day celebrated  
by Canadian troops all  
kinds of sports got out of  
quarantine to see the fun  
good news from the front  
Great offensive started,  
Captured first line trenches.

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for 16 miles & still going  
July 4<sup>th</sup>

fine & warm sea is calm  
and beautiful can see  
fishing smacks and trawlers  
and destroyers and one  
Submarine & a seaplane  
which travelled very fast  
skimming over the water  
nothing could look more  
peaceful saw a military  
funeral of a man who  
blew his brains out

86<sup>th</sup> band played the  
dead march and firing  
party fired 3 volleys  
very impressive scene  
~~we~~ saw a mine  
exploded the earth

all round trembled  
and shook like a quake  
weather is beautiful

July 5<sup>th</sup>

came out of hospital  
went on 6 days pass  
arrived in London 10.30 pm  
stayed at Y.M.C.A. in  
Horseferry. ~~Rode~~ all night  
saw the searchlights  
playing over the city  
very fine sight

July 6<sup>th</sup>

went from Trafalgar  
square by tube to  
Paddington left there at  
9<sup>th</sup> am arrived Oxford 11.15  
Tynaham 12 noon they were  
all pleased to see me.

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July 7<sup>th</sup>

Went round Lyngham and saw a few friends. hired a bike + rode round old twelve acre. place looks very natural. rode to Witney at night and met Harold, he hired a bike. then we went on to Minster through Burbridge where we saw a number of old friends some of them did not know us. arrived at Minster at 10 pm. where we got a splendid welcome

July 8<sup>th</sup>

Left Minster at 9 pm. on the bike for Bicester arrived there 11<sup>45</sup> am. Had a good time went to picture show with George

stayed there all night too tired to go back.

July 9<sup>th</sup>

Left Bicester at 10 am for Minster. Cousin Ethel came back with me nearly to Kencot arrived at Minster 12 noon. in the afternoon went to Widford and saw Allsworths at Swinbrook, Camp meeting then on to Tordwells. where I saw Grampy. + Alice. then back to Stalleigh. and Worham. Minster. Burbridge and Ducklington. from there through Witney to Lyngham arrived there at 11 p.m.

Aug 11<sup>th</sup>

received sergeants certificate  
also Lewis M.G. certificate

Aug 14<sup>th</sup>

Leave camp at 4.30 am  
for shooting at hythe  
ranges.

Aug 19

finished musketing at  
hythe qualified as a  
first class shot 118 points

Aug 20<sup>th</sup>

Church Service in A.A.C.  
Arena listened to a  
splendid address by Mr  
Sherwood Eddy. Assistant  
Secretary to the International  
Y.M.C.A.

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Aug 22<sup>nd</sup>

I was in a sham battle  
at the bombing school  
which some French Staff  
Officers witnessed - smoke  
bombs being used and a  
mine was exploded which  
made it very realistic

August 25<sup>th</sup>

at <sup>company</sup> boy of the 86<sup>th</sup> Battalion  
held a farewell concert  
in the Congregational  
School room - it was very good

Aug 28<sup>th</sup>

Left camp on a 6 day pass.  
Stayed at Uxbridge all night

Aug 29

Left Uxbridge at 9 a.m.  
arrived Oxford at 12.  
Had to wait 2 hours for  
a train went up into  
the city had dinner at  
Rosiers High Bridge Street  
then went up into the  
market where I saw Mr  
A.A. Alder. He was very  
pleased to see us. arrived  
at Lyndham at 3 pm went  
to Baptist Church at night  
& saw Mr Boulday.

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all looks very natural. <sup>brings</sup> bring,  
back old memories.

Aug 30<sup>th</sup>

Went up round Swelverne and saw L. Deane. old Fred Brooks and his wife & Black and George Battie and his family. left Eynsham by train at 7. pm met Harold at Witney then went down to Longs and hired a bike and rode on to Minster through Burbridge arriving at Minster at 9.30.

Aug 31<sup>st</sup>

Helped Uncle to pick plums as he was short of help and crop good. At night rode to Burford and saw Uncle Ben. He is looking well.

Sept 1<sup>st</sup>

Cut and tied up barley for Uncle Ted. at night was going to see Grampy got as far as Woxham at Aunt Sarah's when my tire burst and I had to walk back to Minster

Sept 2<sup>nd</sup>

Rode Harold's byke to Witney and got a new tire came back put it on and went on to Asthall - saw Cousin Arthur & Aunt Polly. then down to Fordwells. saw Lucy. & Alice. had a little dinner. then went on to Southlawn & saw Grampy. from there on to Shipton

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and saw Uncle Will he  
is looking much older.  
from Shipton I came back  
to Minster. Then from there  
to Bramley and saw Fred  
Buckingham my last Boss in  
England. From there on to  
Witney Randed in the bike  
went to the station for Lyngham  
arrived there 7.45 pm.

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Sept 3<sup>rd</sup>  
Hired a bike & rode to  
Oxford sent them back  
by train and left Oxford  
at 5:15 pm for London  
and Shorecliffe where we  
arrived at 12 midnight  
also on the 3<sup>rd</sup> a Zepp  
was brought down in

flames at Buffley by  
Lieut Robinson. He was  
awarded the V.C. being the  
first brought down in  
England.

Sept 4<sup>th</sup>  
Started on Machine gun  
class, instructor is Corporal  
Henderson a Burlington boy.

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Sept 17<sup>th</sup>  
Went on week end pass  
to Uxbridge arrived there  
5.30. Had a good time

Sept 18<sup>th</sup>  
Left Uxbridge for London  
by train at 2 o'clock.  
Passed through Hillington  
Southall & Ealing to Acton  
a very nice ride

Went on L.C.W. train at Acton for Highbury station where my cousin met us with his wife - he is got very stout weighs 16 stone has got a smart wife. very flashy but not proud.

they have a very nice home at 230<sup>th</sup> New North road Islington 4 rooms.

Left there 8.30 for Charing Cross and from there at 9.15 to camp arrived 11.15 pm.

Sept 23<sup>rd</sup>

On the night of the 23 + 24<sup>th</sup> 2 more Zepp. were brought down in Essex, one crew being captured alive. a lot of damage done.

Sept 28

went to Sandy Lane to fire on miniature ranges with colt machine gun

Oct 1<sup>st</sup>

On night of Oct 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> another Zepp. was brought down at Potters Bar.

Oct 2.

went to Hythe Range to fire with colt machine gun

Oct 7<sup>th</sup>

week end Paris to London arrived at New North Rd at 5 pm.

Oct 8

Saw cousin again went to see a little of the city, saw St Pauls. and

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Buckingham Palace the  
Queen Victoria memorial.  
Marble Arch. War Office.  
Home Guards. and other  
notable places. Parliament  
Buildings & Westminster Abbey  
a very enjoyable time  
left Charing Cross Station  
at 9.15 pm for Shorecliffe

Oct 13

On picquet at Folkestone  
saw an accident, also  
a wounded man very  
much hurt taken to  
Hospital in ambulance.

Oct 14

Medical inspection. passed  
the doctor and put on  
draft to the 10th Batt.

Oct 15

Went to Hyde to fire  
running practice.

Oct 18

Advance party leaves the  
Depot for Broughborough where  
the whole Depot is going.

Oct 21<sup>st</sup>

Trafalgar day. up at  
4.30. breakfast at 5. am.  
fall in at 6 o'clock. ready  
to proceed to France.  
Left Barracks at 6.45 am  
to Headquarters. left there  
at 9.15 boarded train at  
Shorecliffe at 9.15 passed  
through Redhill. Guildford  
Winchester. arrived at

Southampton at 1.45 pm  
had some refreshments and  
went on board the Princess  
Victoria at 4.45. boat not  
very large. and crowded. Decks  
are large and extensive.

Left Southampton at 5.30 pm

Oct 22<sup>nd</sup>

arrived at Le Havre. 12.30 am  
after an uneventful voyage  
not sick at all. weather  
fine but cold ... came off  
the boat at 7.30 am left  
Le Havre at 8 am. passed  
numerous war supplys.  
including big guns. the  
city is very dirty. buildings  
old and dilapidated.  
passed very large munitions

factoys, french children  
very dirty and begging  
money and cigarettes.  
arrived at camp at 11 am  
after several delays.  
got dinner at Y.M.C.A. and  
changed money. at 1 o'clock  
medical inspection. which  
was not very severe  
also received Lee Enfield  
Rifle No 17031 name of  
village near camp. Rouelles.

Oct 23<sup>rd</sup>

received 120 rounds of  
ammunition, also inspected  
by a Brigadier General  
left camp 7 pm. arrived at  
Le Havre. at 9 pm after a very  
hard march + came down a  
large number of steps. went on  
train. at 10 pm as escort to  
two prisoners

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Oct 24

left Le Havre at 1 am.  
a long heavy train. had lots  
of room. slept well. arrived  
at Rouen. at 8 am. after  
passing through 2 long  
tunnels train very slow  
at 9 am went up to ~~rest~~  
camp. where we got hot  
tea & sandwiches very cheap  
also a wash and clean up  
rainning hard. saw  
German prisoners at work  
district very hilly lots of  
traffic on the river Sein.  
left the next camp at 3 pm  
marched to the station, weather  
cleared off. Left Rouen at 5 pm  
in box cars 30 of us in one car  
very tight squeeze.

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Oct 25

arrived at Etaples at 8 am  
after a very ~~tiresome~~<sup>tiresome</sup> ride  
buildings looks very old  
very busy station, Australian  
troops passing through  
enroute for the some after  
being at ~~Etaples~~<sup>Etaples</sup>. a very  
large British and Colonial  
camp near the town.

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Left Etaples at 6 pm.  
arrived at St Pol. at 9 pm  
just settled down nicely  
for the night. when we  
were bundled out and  
marched to a rest camp  
we were put in a  
recration hut. earth floor  
very damp and cold.

Oct 26<sup>th</sup>

midnight too cold to sleep  
went out & walked about  
to get warm. could plainly  
see the flashes from the  
big guns on the firing line  
went back to the station  
and into a room where  
there was a nice fire.  
had a little sleep.

came out at 5 am. had  
a wash and shave.

then went across the road  
and had some breakfast  
in a French house.

St Pol is a quiet old  
place but quite a  
large busy station.  
left St Pol. at 3 pm. in  
Motor Transporte arrived

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at La Bourte at 4:30 2nd  
Brigade Headquarters. passed  
the doctor and was detailed  
with G. Waterfield & B. Fordham  
to no. 1 platoon at Coy 10<sup>th</sup> Batt  
taken to our billets at 6 pm  
which is in a large barn  
had no blanket did not sleep  
very well too cold & draughty

Oct 27<sup>th</sup>

Up at 7:00 paraded at 8:30  
for half an hour. then  
through for the day.  
saw some of the fellows  
with their shirts off  
picking out vermin  
the billets is a French farm  
which is very dirty compared  
with Canadian or English farms.  
sanitary arrangements are  
very bad in France.



Oct 31<sup>st</sup>

Weather still stormy had a little rifle drill in the morning in the afternoon a Divisional inspection of gas helmets. rations issued biscuits + cheese.

Nov 1<sup>st</sup>

two hours drill in the morning in the afternoon a bath parade about three miles away across muddy fields. on our way back nearly got lost and was covered with mud not being able to pick our way in the dark - we also got paid 15 francs. or 12/6. pay book being dated Nov 2<sup>nd</sup> the name of our present billets is Erree Bauchie

Nov 2<sup>nd</sup>

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up at 6 am ... fall in 7.30 and left Erree Bauchie for brigade billets nearer the front line passed numerous trench work and light railways. arrived at our destination at 9.45 am name of it ~~garrison~~ which has been heavily shelled nothing but walls left standing trees almost bare billets are fairly good. in made up huts fine place in ours. raining hard. saw a battery of artillery. left at 7 pm on a work party for the trenches went through lots of mud + water was working on a tunnel. shells. + ~~more~~ more shells. + machine gun fire. <sup>lost</sup> lost our way in the trenches lots of great big rats.

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Nov 3.

arrived back at billets at 6 am  
very tired and covered in mud  
had rum ration and breakfast  
went to sleep till noon. in  
afternoon saw anti aircraft gun  
~~firing~~ at enemy aeroplane  
pretty sight. left for trenches  
again at 6.30. went to a  
different sap which was much  
better than the last not as  
muddy.

Nov 4<sup>th</sup>

arrived back at 6 am. not  
quite so tired done very  
little work had rum went  
to sleep till noon. went on  
another work party again to  
a different sap which was very  
good. but close to forty

Nov 5<sup>th</sup>

arrived back at 5.30 am.  
myself + Wakefield warned to  
be ready to proceed to the  
Lewis Gun school at 6.30  
left at 7.30 + marched to  
Divisional Headquarters where  
some more joined us and we  
left there at 10.45 am on  
motor bus. arrived at Pernes  
at 12.30 after passing through  
some nice country and ~~several~~  
large towns Pernes en Vaucluse  
is quite a nice large town  
we are billeted in a large  
flour mill and very draughty  
near a stream. supper was  
very good beans + pork  
and bully beef + tea.  
gave some more 36<sup>th</sup> men

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Nov 6<sup>th</sup>

still raining. started on  
the Lewis Gun ~~course~~<sup>course</sup> at  
2 pm. at night, a concert  
which was very good. the  
28 band being present.

Nov. 7.

still raining. nothing of  
importance happened.  
Had some fun in a shop  
trying to make the girl  
understand English buying  
some cards.

Nov 8

still raining. Had some  
fun with the Frenchman  
who gave us a calling down  
for filling his mill with  
tin & rubbish he had  
the mill working.

Nov 9<sup>th</sup>

Nice fine day. mill still  
working. market day in  
Peres. quite a novel affair  
28<sup>th</sup> band concert at night.

Nov 10<sup>th</sup>

Fine day. large number of  
Australian Artillery pass  
through the town. done  
some firing on the ranges with  
the Lewis gun. the old  
Frenchman was calling us up  
early made the boys mad.  
Bought a cigarette case.

Nov. 11<sup>th</sup>

Fine day. first stoppage  
with Lewis gun.

Nov 12.

Dig trenches all morning  
little service in cinema hall  
at night which was very good.

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Nov 13<sup>th</sup>

digging trenches. a large French battle plane came down near us. very misty. concert at night which was very comical

Nov 14<sup>th</sup>

dig trenches till 10 am.. had orders to move. left Parnes at 2 pm<sup>o</sup> on bus 34. after many delays owing to engine trouble arrived at Div Headquarters at 4:30 from there to the transport links at 5 pm. stayed with signalers all night

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Nov 15

got new pair of boots  
left front for front line  
at 10 am. joined the  
Batt at 3 pm

Nov. 16

fine & cold & rainy, a little  
windy, sending over shells

Nov 17

fine & cold work parties  
at night. at 11 am one of  
our <sup>Army</sup> ~~army~~ bangs. fell short  
& blew Corporal Galloway  
to pieces. he was well  
liked and the first to make  
friends with us it was  
a horrible sight. I got one  
of his buttons in remembrance

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Nov 18

Our Brigade is relieved we  
leave front line at 3 pm  
marched back to Brieux Barachin  
was just about all in feet  
tremendously sore. went on grand

Nov 19

stormy & cold ~~not~~ not feeling very good.
